Solar panels

n keeping with St John's focus on becoming a more Eco-friendly Church and in accordance with the decision of Church Meeting on 18th November 2018 photovoltaic solar panels have now been installed on the south facing roof of the Large Hall.

There are 18 panels with the installation having a Total Installed Capacity of 5.58 kilowatts producing

electricity for building users, with any surplus being fed back into the National Grid.

The main meter showing the amount of electricity being provided by the solar panels PV is located in the cupboard in the kitchen and it is proposed to provide a display monitor to be situated in the entrance vestibule to show the energy use of the Church and PV generation.

A feed-in-tariff application has been submitted to the current energy supplier SSE the results of which are awaited.

The overall cost of the installation is £8,000. The Church appreciates the contributions from a number of Church members and we are fortunate to have received a grant of £1800, shared between the organ fund and solar panel PV fund, from the Allchurches Trust Limited. One other grant application has been made and a response is awaited.

An Energy Performance Certificate giving a Certificate Rating of 'C' has been obtained indicating that the Church buildings are reasonably energy efficient although improve-ments can be made in some areas.

14 March Session One: Worshipping Engages Our Whole Lives



Main Results of the 2018 Climate Change Questionnaire

Organised by the Green Christian-Barnet Group

An analysis by Alan Pryor and edited by Tony Shepherd.

The Questionnaire was carried out between September and November, 2018.

Introduction: we received 24 'Returns" and here we present the main findings – giving the top four answers to each question, as appropriate. Full results are available at: www.climateconcern.co.uk, or contact us for more details.

Q1: What are the 3 Most Important Environmental Conditions?

People were asked to choose 3 in order of importance.3 points for1st choice, 2 for 2nd, 1 for 3rd]

(1) Global Warming: 9*3+5*2+2*1 **39 points**(2) River & Sea Pollution: 6*3+5*2+5*1 **33**(3) Using Up Earth's Resources: 2*3+6*2+4*1 **22**(4) Air Pollution: 3*3+1*2+2*1 **13**

Q2: To What is the Changing Weather Pattern Due? Suggestions were: "Human Activity", "Global Changes": "Both of these" (Only one to be chosen)

(1) Human Activity: chosen by 13

(2) Both of human and global: chosen by 9

(3) Global change: chosen by none.

Answer we suggest: Humans are largely to blame!

Q3: How to Reduce the Effects of Climate Change?

A number of suggestions were printed for people to choose from. (We gave 3 points for peoples' 1st choice, 2 for 2nd, 1 for 3rd)

The top four results were:-

(1st equal) Reducing carbon emissions: 41 points (1st equal). Seek new sources of renewable energy:

41points

(3) Laws to prevent further losses of rain forests:

20 points

(4) New building techniques for zero carbon emission homes: 14 points

Q4: Is Climate Change affecting you now or is likely to in the future?

[Six questionnaires stopped at Q3, so only 17 responded to this and remaining questions.]

Answers were: "Yes"= 14 "No"= 1. "Don't Know"= 2 Responses were clear and popular suggestions were-:

Increases in air pollution affect asthmatics; Heat waves affect elderly & infirm people; Excessive high tides & storms cause flooding damage; and yet there are droughts and/or wild fires in other places (e.g. Australia and California)

Q5: Can anything be done to tackle climate change?

Several ideas were given by respondents here in Q5 and in the remaining questions:-

Suggestions included:-

Make more use of public transport

Dramatically reduce the use of plastics, especially single-use plastics

Insulate homes and buildings better

Educate people on what can be done

Put pressure on local and national governments, and on journalists

Lobby for increased grants for solar panels Reduce the use of pesticides and chemicals

Some Initial Conclusions about the results from this Questionnaire:-

Even with only 23 respondents some useful and thought-provoking answers and comments have emerged. We will discuss these results in a future Blog on the web site: www.climateconcern.co.uk and also at future meetings of the Green Christian-Barnet Group. Desert Island Discs with Ann Kirby

ong-time St John's Church member Ann Kirby was warmly welcomed as our Desert Island castaway gduring our Fellowship meeting on Wednesday. Ann had previously attended New Barnet Congregational church, singing with its ambitious and flourishing junior choir and has continued her involvement with the life of St John's through choir and musical presentations. We highlighted many important events in Ann's rich and varied life and career, throughout which she has made good friends amongst teachers and musicians.

Ann was born in pre-war Brixton, but her family very

soon moved to Barnet - memories of wartime air raids, late nights, a Morrison shelter and a white goat. She would soon attend Cromer Road School and was introduced by her family to literature and music. Her first choice for the desert island gramophone was Bach's 2nd Brandenburg Concerto.

Ann later moved to East Barnet Grammar School where she would win a Junior Exhibition and an opportunity to study at the Royal Academy of Music on Saturday mornings, where she made many musical friends. At school she chose the Arts subjects, studying English, French and German to A-level, which together with memories of Woolacombe holidays prompted her second choice of music, Charles Trenet's La Mer. Ann recalled that Alan Coren was a fellow sixth-form member at East Barnet, where dedicated teaching and strong belief in co-education prevailed. Meanwhile, the Congregational Junior Church choir continued to flourish.

Ann entered a four-year graduate course at the Royal Academy of Music and a final year at the University of London where there was much opportunity to attend rehearsals, concerts and operas. Ann played flute in London Junior and Senior Orchestras, with the Du Pré sisters and James Galway at the Royal Albert and Royal Festival Halls. Her third choice for the Desert Island was Martti Tavela singing In deisen heil'gen Halle from Mozart's opera The Magic Flute.

Ann became music teacher at Southaw Girls' School under a formidable headmistress and during the 'bulge years' when the school adopted five-stream entry, Ann being responsible for all music teaching. Elaine Paige was a star amongst her pupils who has always shown gratitude for her tuition and encouragement, later including an invitation to appear in her This is Your Life programme. Ann also had opportunity through her brother to meet many famous composers, including Tippett, Britten and Ella Grainger. The early 1960s were years of uncertainty, upheaval and CND marches and protests and Ann's participation in events led her and many others to peaceful confrontation and arrest. Fittingly, Ann's fourth choice of music was Joan Baez singing Pete Seeger's Where have all the flowers Gone?

Ann joined the staff at Lyndhurst School in Borehamwood where the drama teacher had high expectations and produced plays involving music. Ann met Bill, her husbandto-be during this time. Their two daughters attended St John's Church Record March – April 2019

Cromer Road School and took part in the St John's musicals.

When teaching at Lyonsdown School Ann asked St John's Director of Music Richard Harvey to write the music for *The Snow Queen.* He also wrote the Libretto and the production was a great success. Although retired from teaching in 2002, Ann continued to travel widely and

continues singing with Finchley Choral Society. Further records for the Desert Island included selections from Prokofiev's Romeo and Juliet and Bach's Matthäus Passion, Handel's Dixit Dominus, and closing with Howard Skempton's song He wishes for the Cloths of Gold.

As her extra book Ann chose *War and Peace* and for her luxury item a harpsichord and copies of Bach's 48 Preludes and Fugues to play, Bach being her favourite composer.

Thanks to Ann for visiting our Desert Island and providing us with a most enjoyable evening. We also thank Ron for his hard work on sound and vision!

The Leprosy Mission is an International Christian development organization that diagnoses, treats and offers special care, including reconstruction surgery, to leprosy patients.




Please continue to pass any used stamps to me, or put them in my pigeonhole, or in the box downstairs.
