

The Church in Testing Times



"Founded in 948 AD"

o states the noticeboard of St Stephen's Church on Watling Street near St Albans. I glanced this as I was approaching an intersection by car, on my way to visit someone. At the time I thought I had misread the date. Surely this little parish Church could not have been in continuous existence for over a thousand years? But when I returned home and consulted the church website, I discovered that the date is correct; at least within

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10 years or so (which makes it even older than the Church of St Mary the Virgin, East Barnet, founded 1080). Apparently, there is a small window in the Parish Centre deep-set in rough masonry that has been dated to the mid-tenth century. That made me think about what the many generations of worshippers in that little Parish Church had witnessed, and, in particular, what difficulties and challenges they would have faced and endured. Here's a select list: The Norman Invasion and Conquest from 1066. The Bubonic Plague Pandemic from 1346. Henry VIII's and Thomas Cranmer's reforms of the Church in the 1530's would have had a direct impact on church life. The Great Civil War of 1642-51 may have set Royalists against Parliamentarians within the congregation! There was a succession of wars between Britain and France. The First World War 1914-18 that killed many young men. The Influenza Pandemic of 1918-20 that killed many more people than the war did. The Second World War 1939-45. The gradual drift away from Christianity in British culture in the 20th and 21st centuries. I'm assuming that the generations of worshippers in that little Parish Church could not have been unaffected by these events and factors. And yet that Church has managed, I assume, to maintain a continuous witness to Jesus Christ for over a thousand years.

At the time of writing this article, the UK Government has warned us to prepare for an increase in the transmission of the coronavirus Covid-19. None of us knows how widely the virus will spread and the extent of the risk it might present, but the experience of China and Italy ought to make us cautious. If the outbreak becomes an epidemic it may be a severe test of whether are willing to accept stringent limits on our way of life for the common good. Currently, like many, I'm adopting an approach that I hope is neither complacent on the one hand nor panicked on the other. But that is easier said than done!

It may be salutary to compare our situation

today to 100 years ago when, in 1920, the influenza epidemic had caused an estimated 50 million deaths worldwide. Back then the UK had neither an NHS nor the medical expertise to treat infectious diseases that we have today. We also have today a Civil Service and Government and News Media that is comparatively transparent in its sharing of information. This means that we should be able to find reliable information as required.

St John's Church offers the following advice to those who attend our services and meetings:

- 1. If you are feeling unwell, stay at home; if symptoms persist, call your GP or 111
- 2. A reminder of best-hygiene practices that will help to protect you and others: wash your hands frequently, and catch any coughs or sneezes in a disposable paper tissue.
- 3. On Sunday morning the Door Elder will welcome you with a friendly greeting but not a handshake
- 4. There is an alcohol-based hand sanitiser near the entrance
- 5. We will exchange the Peace verbally but not physically following the Lord's Supper

At present we can continue to meet with these precautions. However, St John's Church will also monitor official advice about public gatherings if the virus becomes more widespread. In the event of a ban on medium-sized public gatherings, we are blessed to have various alternative ways we can continue to communicate and support one another. Above all, let us remember the affirmation of the psalmist, one that the Church has leaned on during testing times: "The Lord is good and his love is everlasting, his faithfulness endures to all generations." (Psalm 100:5)

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RE-OPENING OF THE NEWLY REFURBISHED PETER COLLINS ORGAN

here was standing room only at a concert featuring five organists in St John's Church on Saturday 1st February. The occasion was the re-opening of the Peter Collins organ after a major overhaul and refurbishment costing £42,000, the majority of which was raised by church members. The audience were thrilled by the varied programme of music chosen by the five organists to show off the newly refurbished organ. Richard Harvey said he was absolutely delighted to share the programme with his fellow organists, Terence Atkins, Robin Coxon, Dr. Robert Manning and his own pupil, Drew Sellis, who

is Organ Scholar elect for Jesus College, Cambridge. Also in the concert was local soprano, Àine Cook, who sang beautifully in two airs from Handel's oratorio, Messiah, and opera, Semele. The audience's appreciation of the evening was evidenced by the fact they gave so generously to the two charities, the ON Organ Fund – the only national fund of its kind in this country devoted exclusively to the support of pipe organs – and Help Musicians UK – an independent UK charity for professional musicians of all genres, from starting out through to retirement. A total of £938 was raised.

A Murder Most "Profitable" Geoff Bowden

Make Tellowship members who braved the cold and rain to join their friends at Fellowship, were treated to a fascinating and amusing talk by Geoff Bowden, who turned out to be a bit of a Agatha Christie nut!

Agatha Millar was born in Torquay on 15th September 1890, to an American Stockbroker father and an English mother. After an unremarkable childhood, showing little sign of a literary future, Agatha met and fell in love with Archibald Christie, whom she married on the eve of the first world war. She became a nurse during the war, where as an apothecaries' assistant, she picked up her impressive knowledge about drugs and poisons.

She was to use this knowledge to underpin the plot of many of her future books. While her husband was away at war, Agatha began to write, but it was not until the age of thirty in 1920, that her first book "The Mysterious Affair at Styles" was published, this featured Hercule Poirot. However, the publishers, Bodley Head, managed to secure all rights to the book for just twenty five pounds!

In 1926 Agatha became the centre of a mystery herself. By this time, her marriage to Archibald Christie had failed, following his affair with Nancy Neele. After a quarrel on the night of 3rd December Agatha left home in her Morris Cowley, but did not return! The car, along with her fur coat, was found abandoned the following morning, just a few miles away. Her disappearance was headline news and even the Home Secretary got involved.

A week after her disappearance, a reporter spotted her in the Swan Hydropathic Hotel in Harrogate. She was staying under the name of Mrs Neele, the name her husband's lover! Agatha maintained she had suffered from memory loss, but we shall never know what really happened, as she took the mystery to her grave.



Outwardly Agatha was a shy, middle class housewife. However, the real Agatha had tremendous appetite adventure, travelling Bagdad alone on the Orient

Express and to many Far Eastern archeological sites. It was during one of these visits that Agatha met

her second husband, Max Mallowan. The marriage in 1927 was a rather scandalous for the time, as Agatha was forty and Max twenty seven.

Agatha continued to produce a book a year throughout the thirties, forties and fifties, with publications like "Murder at the Vicarage", where we first meet Miss Marple, "Murder on the Orient Express", "Ten Little Niggers" (now renamed - "Then there Were None"). In 1952 she wrote "Three Blind Mice", which we now know as "The Mousetrap", which has been on stage in London continuously for sixty eight years.

Many of her books were turned in to films and plays, some more successfully than others. This success brought considerable wealth to Agatha and the family. In 1938 the couple bought the Greenway Estate in Devon, which remained the family home until her death. Greenway is now under the care of the National Trust, where visitors

get a glimpse into her life.

She continued to work throughout the sixties and seventies, becoming a Dame in 1971. Agatha wrote two books which intended to published posthumously. However, in her last year she did agree to their publication, so in 1975 we found out how Hercule Poirot met his end during his last case in "Curtains" and how Miss Marple ended her very long career with "Sleeping Murder".

Agatha passed away on 12th January 1976

Guinness World Records lists her novels as having sold over 2 billion copies, and her estate claims her works come third in the rankings of the world's most-widely published books, behind only Shakespeare and Bible. Her books have been translated into at least 103 languages. This shy, middle class English lady became the best-selling novelist of all time.
