Taking our Stand with Jesus

hen Christians claim to identify with Jesus Christ, what is it we are claiming? You will each have your own ideas about what this claim means for you. I wish to share some thoughts about what this claim means for me, prompted by reading the book that some of us are discussing during Lent, Being Christian by Rowan Williams. He writes that being a Christian is to take our stand with Jesus in the middle of the "...joy of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit; and in the middle of the world of threat, suffering, sin, and pain." (p. 7)

When I read and listen to the Gospels, I am struck by how Jesus regards the things he says and does not as his words and actions alone but as utterances and doings in agreement with God the Father and the Holy Spirit. For example, when some challenged

Jesus for healing on the Sabbath because this was 'work', Jesus indicates that he thinks he is doing God's work: "The Son can do nothing by himself, he does only what he sees the Father doing" (John 5:19). When others challenged Jesus about the power by which he freed persons from demonic possession, he replied, "Since it is by the Spirit of God that I drive out demons, be assured that the Kingdom of God has come among you" (Matthew 12:28).

We take our stand with Jesus first of all in baptism, which is the beginning of a life of dying with Jesus to reliance on our own material resources and coming alive with Jesus to the spiritual resources given by God the Father. We take our stand with Jesus in prayer, praying with Jesus to God as "Our Father..." We take our stand with Jesus by reading the Bible, the same Scriptures that Jesus himself read and reinterpreted, the Scriptures that the Holy Spirit helps us to understand and apply.

We also take our stand with Jesus in the middle of 'threat, suffering, sin, and pain'. As a pastor, I am aware that for some people life is an exhausting struggle. Problems with health or work or family are, for some people, overwhelming. Jesus said "Come to me all of you who are weary and carrying heavy burdens and I will give you rest...for my yoke is easy and my burden is

light" (Matthew 11:28-30). To take our stand with Jesus means to be yoked with him by faith, and this means that we don't have to struggle on alone because our struggle is shared and is thereby lightened.

Our struggle is shared and lightened not only because of Jesus's strength conveyed to us by the Spirit, but also because of the combined strength of Jesus's corporate Body, the Church. To stand with Jesus means never having to stand alone, "...in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs together" (Romans 12:5). We demonstrate this corporate unity whenever we unite to worship God, which I find to be a great source of strength. Corporate worship is also an opportunity to pray for other members of the Church, especially Christians who are being threatened because of the stand they are taking for Jesus. Let us pray for the Church in Syria, Iraq, Palestine, and Lebanon, standing in solidarity with them and with Jesus. Below is a suggested prayer:

Redeeming God, strengthen your Church in Syria, Iraq, Palestine and Lebanon. As they stand with Jesus, we stand with them, praying that the gospel of reconciliation will bring healing and peace, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

aura gave us a very interesting insight into the various difficulties and types of dementias; the need for understanding and practical help. She broke the ice by introducing a game of Bingo to discover our various perceptions which included loss of memory, short term memory loss, Alzheimer's disease and the dying of brain cells. In this country there are around 800,000 with various forms of this condition. 'We

Laura explained that Dementia Friends has been formed by the Alzheimer's Society and invited us to become involved, issuing forms and badges. Action encouraged might range from displaying patience when a shopper is struggling with change in the supermarket checkout queue to perhaps befriending and staying in touch with someone living with dementia. Wearing the badge will identify you to others as a Dementia Friend and perhaps lead to opportunities to talk about your involvement.

The talk ended with a game involving members who were given instruction on how they thought someone with Alzheimer's would react in certain situations. Members had quite different interpretations, but as Laura pointed out, we are all different and unless we knew exactly how their home was adapted, how well normal living could be managed and what amount of help was available we could not predict their behaviour or how they would cope.

February Meeting

London Waterways

On 18 February the Fellowship gathered to hear Roger Squires from Rotherhithe talk to us on the above topic.

Roger is a volunteer with the London Canal Museum, Kings Cross and spoke to us about the main waterways which pass through North London, including the Thames, Lee, Stort, and the New River which is neither new nor a river. The talk was illustrated by slides most of which Roger took himself.

Roger started by taking a look at the New River. This marvel of an artificial waterway,

celebrated its 400th Anniversary in 2013. It was the brainchild of **Sir Hugh Myddelton** and building started in 1608. The original water source was Chadwell Springs near Ware. When these springs became unable to supply the requirements, water was abstracted from the River Lee. By following the 100ft contour line, the builders managed to achieve a very gradual descent to Islington, allowing the water to flow from Chadwell Springs to to reservoirs at River Head in Islington.

The River Lee has been navigable since the 9th



century. It is navigable from Hertford which at one time had a number of grainstores by the river. Ware was a centre of grain collection, and barges took it from there to Bromley by Bow, a centre of milling for London. The Olympic Stadium is nearby. Beyond the Stadium the Lee reaches the Thames via Bow Creek. Limehouse Cut, built in 1770, goes off from Bramley Locks to join the Thames at Limehouse.

The Regents Canal was opened at Limehouse in 1820. John Nash and the Prince Regent proposed a canal through Regents Park to the basin at the Barracks which would continue to link with the Limehouse Basin. This was a major

trade route for timber and coal. As with most canals within London, the towpath is today used mostly by walkers and joggers. The canal passes London Zoo in Regent's Park.

Nash set aside plots in the Park for luxury houses - but these didn't get built until the 1990s!

Roger then went on to briefly describe and show us photos of the Paddington Arm, the Grand Union Canal and the River Thames. Although the use of these waterways for goods transportation has now diminished or disappeared, Roger showed that they are still a valuable asset for London and its inhabitants.

After completing an English degree, Maggie Butt became a newspaper reporter, moving to BBC TV as a documentary writer, producer and director. She later returned to poetry, completing a PhD in creative writing from Cardiff University. Ally Pally Prison Camp, published June 2011 by Oversteps Books, charts the use of Alexandra Palace in North London as a 'concentration camp' for civilian enemy aliens during the First World War. It tells the story of the internees through black and white photographs, the paintings of internee George Kenner, extracts from memoirs and letters, and Maggie Butt's own poems.

Maggie Butt is Deputy Dean in the School of Arts and Education at Middlesex University, London.



to a whole new school of organ building, known as the English Organ Reform Movement, influencing in the UK alone the cathedral organs of Coventry and Blackburn. For an organ, following these design principles, to be installed in a local church was quite unusual at the time and the opening recital drew a quite a crowd from the organ world.

On the snowy morning of 17th January I talked to the assembled organists briefly about the history of the organ at St John's Church and then played a twenty minute recital on the organ to show off its various tonal colours.

My programme included pieces from the sixteenth century French composer, Clerambault's Suite du premier ton, the twentieth century Belgian composer, Flor Peeter's Variations on 'Come, Holy Ghost', two short pieces by Pe-



ter Hurford - organist at St Alban's Cathedral and founder of the organ festival there - and some choral preludes by JS Bach.

Following this, various members of the club had five to ten minutes each playing the organ themselves.

Ours was the first church in Barnet they were visiting that day. They continued on to St Mary's, East Barnet and then to the Parish Church in Chipping Barnet.

They were very appreciative of their welcome, admiring the architecture of the church and they left a donation for church funds.


